This dissertation contends that picturesque aesthetics have a surprising afterlife in realism's visual rhetorics. During a period when images of rural landscapes circulated in a new, mass-media ecosystem, I argue, nineteenth-century novelists (such as Hardy, Dickens, and Eliot), in their realist representations of modernity, critique and deploy picturesque conventions and expand their discursive meanings as they grapple with ethical issues around access, property ownership, and dispossession that resonate into the present.
